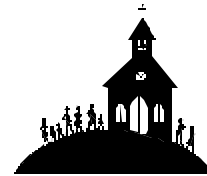

Rally Day is September 7!

The Gospel calls us to teach and learn! The All Saints Sunday School classes begin again on Rally Day, September 7, 2008. We meet from 9:15-10:15 every Sunday, **ALL** are welcome!

All children through 6th grade meet in the sanctuary at 9:15 for music led by Pete Raum, and an opening discussion led by Dan Anderson. Then they break into groups and move to classrooms in the new wing. Preschoolers and Kindergartners are taught by Theresa Fitzsimmons, Julie Christian, and Karol Livingston. 1st and 2nd Graders are taught by Carolyn Schlagel and Jodi Miles. Dan Anderson leads the 3rd and 4th Graders, and Pete Raum works with the 5th and 6th Graders.

In keeping with our mission, to know God and to make Him known to others, we strongly encourage parents to get involved and to reinforce the learning process. There are some basic expectations of parents and children to ensure a safe and effective learning environment for all:

Parents, take an active interest in your children's Sunday School activities.

- On your way home from church, and throughout the week, engage your family in discussions that relate to the weekly Gospel and lessons. We spend a significant part of class time in each grade teaching from the same lessons presented in church. The current lessons are always printed in the bulletin, and the next week's lessons are listed in the calendar section in case you want to read ahead.
- There will also be special projects and memory work along the way, we will do our best to communicate details with you by sending notes home and posting on the bulletin board so you can reinforce the children's efforts.
- **NEW THIS YEAR** Please pick up your children of all ages from their classrooms at 10:15. This may be our only chance to directly share information with you, and we feel responsible for your children's safety when they are in our care.
- You are always welcome in class. Even occasionally, your presence demonstrates to the kids that Christian education is time well spent.
- If you don't sit in class, you can join a the Family Life Forum, a group led by Pastor Scott, scheduled to begin later in September. More information will be available soon.

Children are expected to stay with the group and to participate during class.

- If any children are reluctant to participate in some activities, such as singing or reading aloud, we will seek to engage them in a different way that makes them feel more comfortable.
- If any child is regularly disruptive, our teachers will talk with the parents to seek resolution which may include parents attending class or remaining nearby to handle any problems.
- Reviewing the lessons and practicing memory verses between classes will help the children get the most out of class time.

We look forward to another great year of Christian studies. If you have any questions or suggestions for the program, or would like to get involved just contact any of the teachers, or one of us.

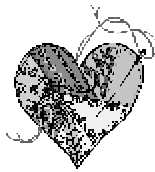

One of the best of the best was to see these teens when they were able to make a difference in all these people's lives. I don't know all the personal experiences that were part of the gifts, but not only the recipients were pleased but the donors were equally blessed.

We are looking for suggestions of books to read and discuss, so if you have a book you can recommend, bring your ideas to the September meeting. For September we will discuss the recently popular book, The Last Lecture by Randy Pausch. At Carnegie Mellon University, professor Randy Pausch was asked to give a "last lecture". What wisdom would you impart to the world if you knew it was your last chance? When computer science professor, Randy Pausch was asked to give such a lecture, he didn't have to imagine it was his last, since he had recently been diagnosed with terminal cancer. But the lecture he gave - "Really Achieving Your Childhood Dreams"- wasn't about dying. It was about the importance of overcoming obstacles, of enabling the dreams of others, and of seizing every moment. It was about living. In this book, Pausch has combined the humor, inspiration, and intelligence that made his lecture such a phenomenon and given it an indelible form.

Rain date will be September 12.



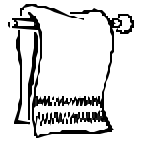
Lutheran World Relief

We are once again collecting items for Lutheran World Relief. These items will be collected during August and September, and sent to Lutheran World Relief the first week of October. The exact date we will be packaging these items for LWR will be announced in the Sunday Bulletins.

Items needed are:

For Layettes: shirts or onesies, gowns or sleepers in sizes up to 24 months. Receiving blankets. Gently used, clean items can be substituted for new.

For Health Kits: dark color hand towels, dark color washcloth, bath-size bar soap in it’s original packaging, metal nail file or nail clippers with file attached, ½ or ¾ inch Band-Aids (or similar band), a wide tooth comb and a toothbrush. If you provide all of these items, please wrap the smaller items in the washcloth and wrap the washcloth with the remaining items in the towel and tie securely with ribbons or yarn. Do not place them in zip lock bags or other plastic packaging.



We are also collecting additional bars of soap. Please bring bath-size bar in their original wrapping.

Boxes will be placed in the Narthex for collection of these items. Thank you for helping those in need!

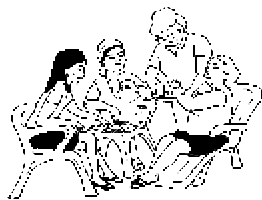

2009 All Saints Church Budget Planning

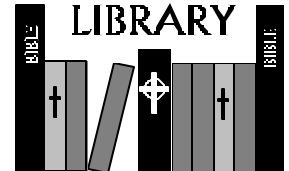
